The Moana Pasifika Voyage

The Moana Pasifika voyage is symbolic of Hawaii's leadership in the revival of traditional voyaging including a renaissance of the strong spiritual and cultural ties of the Pacific people to the ocean. Pacific island people are ocean people nurtured, sustained and inspired through the centuries by her moods and her provision. We come from some of the world's smallest islands but we are citizens of large ocean states – we are warriors, we are voyagers, we are sons and daughters with children of our own. We sail because we are at a juncture in time – what we do with our oceans will determine our future.

Today, the ocean is under threat, a victim of our apathy and selfishness and the demands of growing population and consumerism. We continue to fish well beyond the capacity of the fishery, our modern lifestyles litter and pollute our waters, global warming and climate change are destroying our coral reefs, threatening our livelihoods and changing the chemistry of our ocean. We now have dead zones in our oceans, lifeless... bigger than many countries. The Moana Pasifika is a voyage of the Pacific people, a call for action on OUR Moana Pasifika (Pacific Ocean). We sail with the Hokule'a and the worldwide call for a Sustainable Future. The sails of our vaka are our flags of hope – where once the ocean sustained us, it is now our turn to take action to sustain a healthy Pacific ocean and set a pathway for action on ALL oceans. A sustainable future is dependent on the health of our oceans. A sustainable Moana Pasifika is essential for a healthy and sustainable planet.

A call for Action - The 2030 Pacific Ocean Partnership

The Pacific Ocean Summit recognizes the leadership of the Pacific Island leaders in their aspirations and actions for a healthy Pacific Ocean. The largest commitments for marine managed areas come from our large ocean states and will likely exceed 15 million square kilometres by 2020.

The Tuna fishery in the Pacific island region has implemented the innovative and successful management measures for this highly valuable natural resource. Engagement of coastal communities with the management of their coastal fishery is seeing success and is now replicated around the world. Regional and national marine management policies continue to evolve. Despite this we continue to see a downward spiral in the overall state of our ocean and acknowledge the need for capacity, resources and partnerships. The state of our oceans demands a paradigm shift on how we act on oceans – the scale of action, the kind of partnerships and necessary investments if we are to see a significant improvement by 2030. The Pacific Ocean Summit is an opportunity to call for new partnerships across the Pacific Ocean, and for combined action by the Pacific Ocean States and the Pacific Rim. 60% of the world's economy is represented by countries on the Pacific Rim and they have a disproportionate impact on the ocean. The summit looks to start a movement for action across the Pacific Ocean towards:

- Reducing the threats to the ocean
- Increasing resilience
- Combating climate change

A Pacific Ocean partnership starts with a coalition of the willing – countries, states, provinces, cities, CEOs and other stakeholders that are able to commit to actions for a healthy and sustainable Pacific Ocean up to 2030. The partnership will continue to meet every 3 years – growing the membership and the actions.

The United Nations Sustainable Development Goal 14 on Oceans

The global community of nations in New York launched a vision on oceans in the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, through Sustainable Development Goal 14 (SDG14) to "Conserve and Sustainably use the oceans, seas and marine resources for sustainable development". This calls for leadership at all levels to take urgent action on oceans and the adoption of SDG14 and its many targets including: the prevention and reduction of marine pollution of all kinds; sustainable management and protection of marine and coastal ecosystems; minimize and address the impacts of ocean acidification; conservation of marine areas, sustainable management of fisheries and the elimination of fisheries subsidies that contribute to overfishing and illegal and unreported fishing; and increasing economic benefits for all from the ocean including fisheries, aquaculture and tourism.
